Lifelines concert

29 November 2008

Chris Mann, an acclaimed South African poet, and Janet Suzman, the well known South African actress. introduced our 21st celebratory year by performing 'Lifelines' at St John's

College in Oxford. The performance dealt with the lifelines of animals, from aardvarks to zebras, bees to seahorses and the biosphere of the planet. Chris sang some of his poems and Janet recited others, with a backdrop of magnificent projected illustrations by Julia Skeen. Chris is a Trustee of Masikhulisane, a poverty alleviation programme funded by Thembisa. At Chris's request, the proceeds of

the evening (£1300) will be used to fund lifeskills camps for children from very poor townships in the Eastern Cape. The camps, which are held at a centre on the Swartkops River enable the children to have fun while benefiting from physical, mental, social and spiritual challenges.

The Bonginkosi pre-school in Edendale serves children who would otherwise be unable to attend a pre-school. Some are Aids orphans from households headed by grandmothers, and in some cases their school meals are the only daily meals they get. Bonginkosi is run under the auspices of African Enterprise (AE), but until recently was operating out of a dilapidated, totally inadequate building. Perhaps you remember the picture of the dilapidated old house. What a contrast the new building is! Thembisa played a huge role in raising the funds, by applying to Kennington Overseas Aid (KOA) to adopt Bonginkosi as their chosen charity in 2007. Thembisa was able to pass on more than

£21,000 raised by KOA, to Bonginkosi.

Progress was at first rather slow, with issues of land ownership delaying the building. Now however, the new school is nearing completion, with an official opening planned for around August! Demand for the new school facility continues to rise. There are currently 46 students enrolled (the current school building is suitable for only 20), and a further 11 have been put on a waiting list until the new facility is opened.

Eluxolweni street children's shelter

Abuse, mistreatment, neglect ... what are the life-chances of young children who grow up experiencing only this kind of treatment at home? Many end up on the streets. It is such children that the Eluxolweni street children's shelter in Grahamstown cares for.

The shelter's programmes concentrate on intervention, prevention and re-integration with families if at all possible.

At present the shelter houses 31 children. Recently they re-admitted one boy who was reunited with his family in last year, but was

Some of us are cutting down on luxuries due to the credit crunch, but imagine if you could not afford even one meal a day! WARMTH (War against Malnutrition, TB and Hunger) aims to help people for whom this is all too real a problem, by establishing community kitchens in needy areas around Cape Town. WARMTH provides premises for the kitchens (often converted shipping containers), training for the cooks (nominated by the community), and basic supplies. The cooks receive no salary, but earn money from the meals they sell – basic meals are at a specified, fixed low

price (a voucher scheme projects operates for the very poorest people); the cook can choose to prepare additional dishes under her own initiative if she wants to, and many of the cooks are able to employ helpers.

In 2008 there were a total of 45 kitchens. WARMTH reports that the kitchen operators are becoming increasingly self-reliant, and that the first eight kitchens will be leaving the WARMTH programme. Some of the kitchens are at schools, which means that children receive at least one good meal and are able to

back on the streets over the festive season. This year five of their boys were enrolled at high school, bringing the total number at high school to eleven. One of the boys is now doing his third year at Rhodes University and they are looking forward to his graduation.

Eluxolweni tries to provide not only for the children's physical needs, but also to help them develop as rounded human beings.

Some activities are undertaken with the help of local volunteers. For example, this year the children are doing horse riding, as well as taking part in the Presidents Award (a programme similar to the Duke of Edinburgh's award, that challenges young people to develop excellence). Thanks to Eluxolweni, they can face the future with hope instead of despair.



Bethesda Arts Centre

The Bethesda Arts Centre at Nieu-Bethesda in the Karoo runs varied training. empowerment and income-generating programmes that are changing the lives of some of the most disadvantaged people in South Africa, Before the Centre came into being, the local San/Bushmen people were struggling against alcoholism, abuse, and lack of self-esteem, with very few options for employment or advancement. The Centre is concerned with capacity building; by teaching a wide range of disciplines, it offers local people the opportunity to develop their talents and to grow in self respect. Through the sale of artwork, members of the community become financially independent. Through access to further education offered at the Centre they also widen their opportunities.

Jeni Couzyn, who founded Bethesda, is

currently in residence at the Centre, and leading activities. The textiles group continues to be particularly active and is producing some amazing pictorial quilts. During the year they produced a major new two-part quilt, each piece measuring 4.3 metres by 1.5. It was made by eighteen textile artists and three printmakers at the Bethesda Arts Centre, during the course of 3 months, and was exhibited at Decorex, a design exhibition. Bags and cushions made at the Centre also caught the eye of the fashion editor of The Guardian newspaper and were displayed on their website.

Masikhulisane Trust

Unemployment is particularly rife in the Eastern Cape around Grahamstown. Masikhulisane aims to alleviate poverty through job creation and other programmes to improve people's life chances. During 2008 funds from Thembisa to Masikhulisane supported the following projects:


- Umthathi short term employment and soil reclamation.
- Grahamstown Area Distress Relief Association (GADRA) – Delayed Literacy Programme.
- 3. The Centre for Social Development (CSD) preschool education.

The photos show children participating in the Delayed Literacy Programme. This is run in three primary schools where many students have Xhosa as their home language, but the tuition is in English. As a result 25 to 50% at high school are functionally illiterate. The programme teaches literacy to students in the fourth grade. Volunteer teachers have joined forces with the regular class teachers to implement the programme. The plan is for almost all 17 primary schools in the disadvantaged areas of Grahamstown to eventually be incorporated in the programme.









This is the project chosen by Gary and Deborah Kirsten as the focus of fund-raising to celebrate Thembisa 21st birthday.

In South Africa poverty is rife, and some of the poorest people are located in the Eastern Cape. But amazing people are offering local solutions – like Molly Bam, whose compassion gave birth to the Alexandria Haven. At 18 Molly and her 11 siblings were orphaned. Molly took on the role of parent, and at 19 she took in her first foster child, who now lives and works at the Haven as a carer.

Situated in the Eastern Cape, the Alexandria Haven today consists of a three-bed roomed bungalow that houses upwards of 40 kids. The Haven does not turn away any child in need in spite of very cramped living conditions; often not enough food and no state funding. Some of the children have AIDS. Sporting activities take place on a dusty un-grassed area.

The Alexandria Haven has the ground for expansion but not the funds. The property has been re-zoned from farmland to residential, and subdivided into thirty smaller plots. Funds permitting, the immediate goal is to build six architecturally designed chalets, and to level ground for a sports field.

Vision and Plans

- Ensure the safety of the children by building a secure fence/wall around the property – in progress.
- Level off a large part of the property to provide a playing field and areas for the proposed chalets.
- Each chalet will house six children and an adult. Ideally six chalets to be built soon.
- In the longer term the intention is to create a small village, including a school.

The estimated costs are R80,000 (\pm £5500) for each chalet, and R50,000 (\pm £3500) for the sports field and to level the ground for building.

Thembisa's 21st target is to raise £10,000 for the Haven, for building further accommodation and a suitable grassed playing field.

A dream of an organiser: "Should we at some later stage be able to arrange cricket coaching sessions, this field can be used and children can be brought in from a number of the townships in the area."
